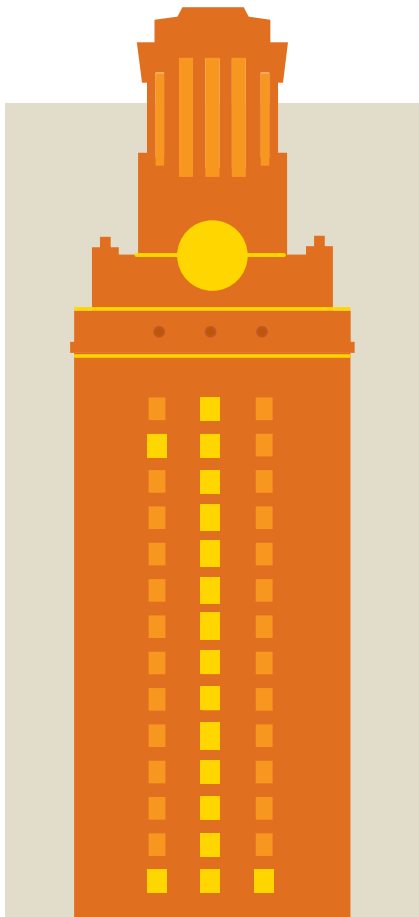

VISITING CAMPUS

Please note, the CDC recommends quarantine for unvaccinated individuals who have been recently exposed to a COVID-19-positive patient.

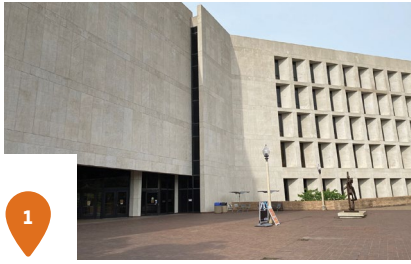


Masks are optional inside university buildings and outdoors. For individuals who are not fully vaccinated or have weakened immune systems, masking and social distancing are optional but recommended.

WELCOME CENTER & PERRY-CASTAÑEDA LIBRARY (PCL)

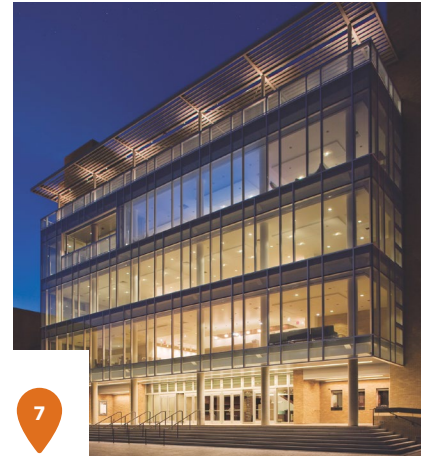
Located at the PCL, the Admissions Welcome Center serves as the front door to the university for prospective students and families. The PCL is the largest of 10 libraries on campus dedicated to supporting research and instruction needs.

SANGER LEARNING CENTER

Located in Jester Center, the Sanger Learning Center offers a wide array of academic support including tutoring, classes and workshops, and peer coaching.

BASS CONCERT HALL (PAC)

Bass Concert Hall doesn't just serve UT. With seating for almost 3,000 people, Bass attracts Broadway shows, orchestras and performances from all over the world.

BLANTON ART MUSEUM (BMA)

At the southern end of campus is the Blanton Museum of Art, one of UT's seven on-campus museums and one of the foremost university art museums in the country. The Blanton has the largest collection of art in Central Texas and UT students receive free admission with their ID. In 2015, renowned American artist Ellsworth Kelly gifted the Blanton the design concept, "Austin."

GREGORY GYM (GRE)

Recreational Sports, which includes a climbing wall, swimming pool and an indoor jogging track, are all housed at Gregory Gym. Expect a packed house when the women's volleyball team hosts matches!

MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. STATUE

Unveiled on the East Mall in 1999, the Martin Luther King Jr. statue serves as an important meeting spot for the annual march and rally in honor of Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy.

JESTER DORMITORY AND JESTER CENTER (JES)

Jester is the largest residence hall on campus. The Sanger Learning Center for tutoring, the Vick Center and the Malcolm X Lounge, the Gallery of Texas Cultures, computer labs, a teaching theater and dining options like Jester City Limits are all located in the Jester Center. All residence halls are outlined in yellow on the map.

DARRELL K ROYAL-TEXAS MEMORIAL STADIUM (DKR)

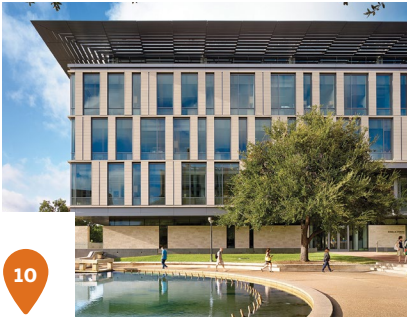
This iconic stadium seats over 100,000 people during home games. With a large section dedicated just to students, you are bound to have an amazing game-day experience.

WILLIAM C. POWERS JR. STUDENT ACTIVITY CENTER (WCP)

Also known as the SAC, the William C. Powers Jr. Student Activity Center hold an auditorium, theater, meeting rooms and an extensive food court. In addition, there is over 25,000 square feet of outdoor seating to accommodate group study sessions and social opportunities. UT has over 1,400 clubs and organizations on campus!

PATTON HALL (RLP)

Patton Hall is home to 16 College of Liberal Arts departments, centers and programs. With over 200,000 square feet of space, you can find numerous offices, labs, classrooms and study spaces.

PETER O'DONNELL BUILDING (POB)

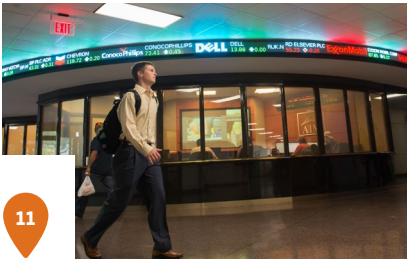
The Peter O'Donnell Building provides a world-class setting for multidisciplinary research and study in computer science, electrical and computer engineering, and computational and applied mathematics. POB is also home to Frontera, the most powerful supercomputer at any university in the world, as well as the eighth most powerful in the world.

NORMAN HACKERMAN BUILDING (NHB)

Hackerman houses nearly 300,000 square feet of research and teaching labs, an auditorium and Imaging Resource Center. The first floor includes Freshman Research Initiative (FRI) labs for the College of Natural Sciences. About 900 freshmen participate in FRI by working alongside their peers and a professor. FRI is the largest undergraduate research program in the nation and has been used as a national model for science education. Perhaps the most recognizable landmark for NHB is Monochrome, the large canoe sculpture outside the main entrance.

MCCOMBS SCHOOL OF BUSINESS (CBA)

The College of Business Administration Building is home to most of the McCombs School of Business. McCombs is consistently ranked as one of the top business schools in the country.

ENGINEERING EDUCATION AND RESEARCH CENTER (EER)

The newest addition to the Cockrell School of Engineering, the EER provides optimal space for a maker space, multidisciplinary labs, the McKinney Library and classrooms, and the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering.

GATES DELL COMPLEX (GDC)

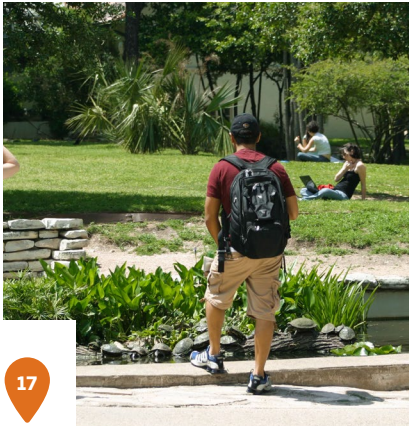
Comprised of two buildings (north and south) connected by a glass atrium and series of bridges, the Dell Gates Complex houses the Computer Science department and an airy atrium offering optimal light for studying and socializing.

G. B. DEALEY CENTER FOR NEW MEDIA (DMC)

As part of the Moody College of Communication, this building houses interactive classrooms and meeting spaces and it is also home to KUT Public Media Studios, serving the entire Austin metro area.

TURTLE POND

A serene and sunny pond just north of the Tower is home to a few dozen species of turtles, including snapping turtles. While the nearby lawn offers a quiet place to hang out, the pond is often used for study in biology classes.

TOWER AND MAIN BUILDING (MAI)

The most distinguishable landmark on the UT campus symbolizes academic excellence and personal opportunity. You will start your Longhorn journey at the Tower on your first day at Gone to Texas and end it there four years later at the ever-impressive University Commencement ceremony. The Tower has seven lighting configurations.

HARRY RANSOM CENTER (HRC)

The Harry Ransom Center is an internationally renowned humanities research center with a collection of nearly 1 million books, more than 42 million manuscripts, 5 million photographs and 100,000 works of art. Highlights include a Gutenberg Bible, one of the earliest surviving photographs, original works by Frida Kahlo and Robert De Niro's archive. The Center offers exhibitions to the public, and students have the opportunity to conduct research on the manuscripts, rare books and visual materials in the collections by visiting the Reading and Viewing Room upstairs.

SOUTH MALL

The South Mall is home to a few of our College of Liberal Arts departments. Here you can get a great view of the Texas Capitol, and on sunny days the area is filled with students reading, listening to music or throwing a frisbee.

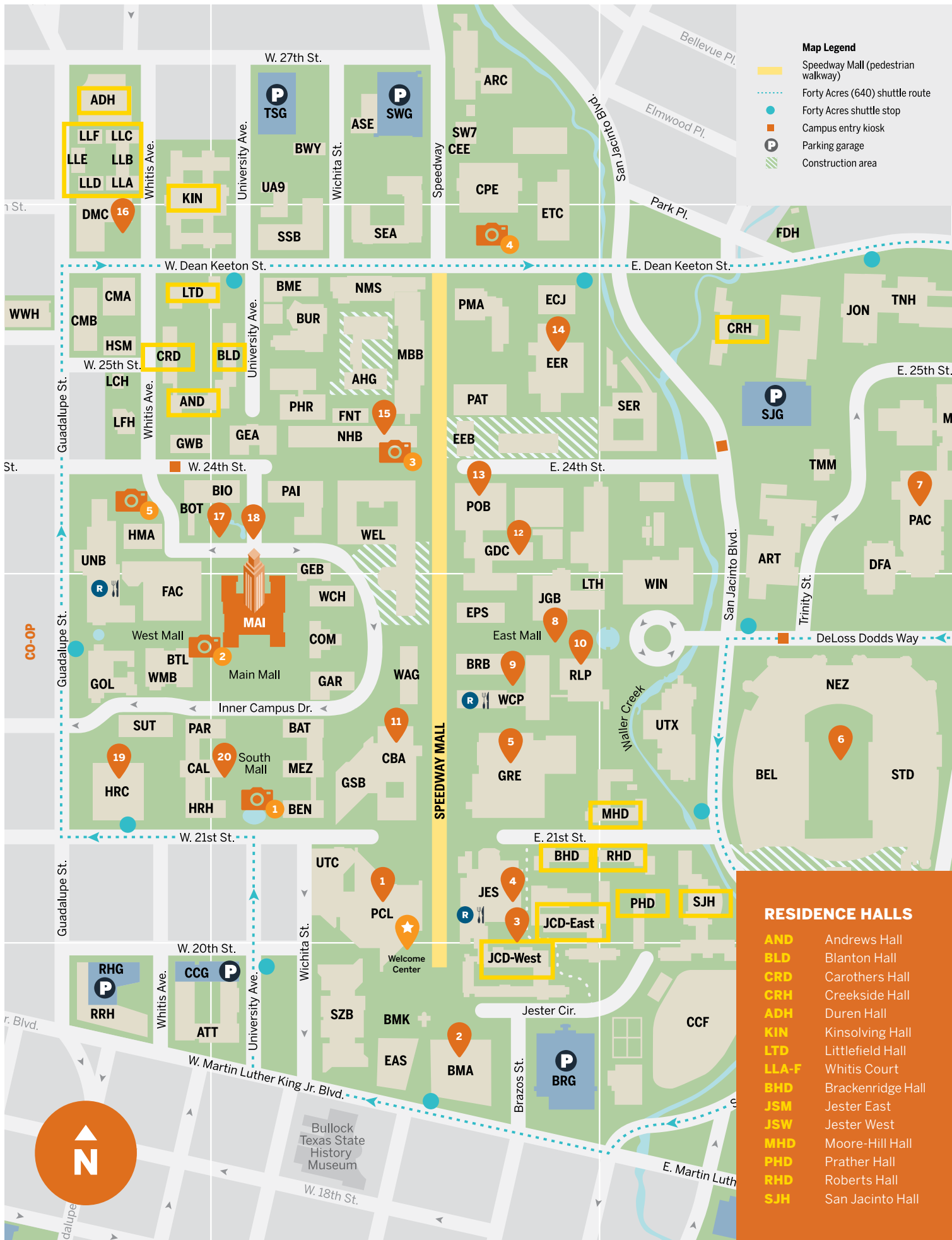
